After over 13 years of much appreciated service to the Village, Bob Weesner retired as Village Manager on July 31. After a competitive selection process, the Village Council hired a Village resident, Dana Peterson, to serve as the next Manager. Here's a note from Dana:

I-495/270 Expansion - The Village of North Chevy Chase, by its Council, submitted comments on August 27, 2018 on the Managed Lane Study, based on the presentation made at the Public Workshop at Pyle Middle School held on July 25, 2018. The comments submitted did not attempt to specifically assess the 15 alternatives that had been identified by MDOT/SHA but rather, reflecting input and concerns raised by a number of Village residents, focused on some more general concerns regarding the Study, including highlighting a number of specific issues that need to be addressed more fully by MDOT/SHA as the work effort progresses. While SHA had previously firmly committed to making a presentation at the upcoming September Village Council meeting on the Managed Lane Study and the possible expansion of I-495/270, we were advised on September 4 that SHA was backing out of that commitment. The supposed rationale was that SHA received over 2300 comments during the last comment period, and wanted to take the time to fully digest those comments before doing any more community outreach. We do not now expect a presentation to be made by SHA directly to the Village Council and residents until sometime in the first quarter of 2019. We have expressed strong concern about this delay, particularly if SHA were to move to the next phase of the process before meeting with us. We will continue to follow up with SHA on this and will keep Village residents apprized of any further developments.

Composting - Montgomery County aims to reduce waste and recycle 70% of the waste generated by 2020. In April 2018 it released a Strategic Plan to Advance Composting, Compost Use and Food Scraps Diversion. The July Village Council meeting included a presentation on the benefits of composting. At the upcoming September Village Council meeting, additional information will be provided with respect to possible participation by Village residents in a Composting Pilot Project sponsored by the Compost Crew. #### REMINDERS

**Bulk Trash Pick up:** Bulk trash pick up will be **Saturday, September 15**. Items must be at curbside by 7 AM. Our contractor uses different trucks to haul different items, so do not be alarmed if certain items are removed before others. Please contact You Call We Haul, Inc. at 301-605-0140 if you wish to dispose of a refrigerator, freezer or air conditioner. <u>Bulk trash includes</u>: washing machines, dryers, stoves, hot water heaters, other major appliances,

furniture or parts of furniture, large toys, bicycles, swing sets, bath tubs, sinks, toilets, do-it-yourself amounts of earth, sand, gravel, demolition debris and construction waste, parts of automobiles, but not fleet tires. Excluded are: Large tree stumps, poisons, acids, caustics, explosives, oil or other flammable liquids, motor vehicles and parts such as batteries and tires, bricks and general construction material, iron pipe over 10 ft. long, large rocks, wood piles, large tree limbs, dead animals, human or animal feces and ammunition.

**Household Hazardous Material:** A permanent collection site for household hazardous waste is set up at the Shady Grove Transfer Station (intersection of Rt. 355 and Shady Grove Rd) on Thursday and Friday (1-5 pm), Saturday (8 am - 5 pm), and Sunday (9:30 am - 5 pm). Household hazardous waste includes insecticides, herbicides, pesticides, paint thinners, swimming pool chemicals, oil-based paints. For any questions, contact the County at 240-777-6410.

**Village Permits:** Please note that permits are required for additions or alterations to existing structures and new construction as well as for the replacement or erection of fences, dumpsters, and sheds.
